Waterfall Season

Waterfall season is nearly upon us! With 3-4 feet of snow on the ground across the Keweenaw and the Western U.P., the falls are going to be absolutely raging in a few week's time when the weather starts to warm up again. Don't miss out on this spectacular occasion – these falls are nowhere near as impressive the rest of the year. Here's a few waterfalls that are off the beaten path and among my favorites.

Sturgeon River Falls. It's going to be a pain to get to in winter, but it'll be well worth the visit. These falls are located southwest of Baraga in the Sturgeon River Gorge, which if you haven't visited is totally amazing. No road for miles near the parking area is plowed in winter, so be prepared to hike in to take a gander at this epic drop.

Slate River Falls. Located in the heart of Baraga County, the Slate River Falls are by far my favorite in the region. Throughout the 1-mile gorge are no fewer than half a dozen major falls of all shapes and sizes, plus many rapids and pools to take in. The gorge is also impressive, but not as much as the Sturgeon River. Beware though, the only trail here is on top of the gorge and affords you few views of the falls below.

Manganese Falls. It's on the main drag leading out of Copper Harbor, but in late winter and early spring should still be inaccessible to most of the area's summertime tourists. The falls are located off of Manganese Road just south of town on the left side of the road. An overlook on top of the cliff gives you decent views of the falls, but to really take them in you'll have to crawl down into the gorge and get up close and personal with the water. Have an escape plan and spare pair of clothes in case you fall in!

Montreal Falls. You thought getting to the Sturgeon River falls was tough? Try getting to the Montreal in early spring! Smith's Fisheries Road is going to be a muddy wasteland by the time the falls are raging, but if you can make it will be a feat of your exploratory prowess. Be

Girl Scouts: Silent Killers

NEW YORK -- A new study out of the New York University Medical Center shows that, given the fat and sugar content of the cookies they sell to an unsuspecting public, the Girl Scouts of America are killing thousands of people every year.

"They look very innocent, even wholesome in their little green sashes and brown skirts," said Dr. Bentley Worthington, who coordinated the study. "But those little girls are, technically, peddlers of death just as sure as the corner drug dealer is."

"I'm just saying," he added.

Thin Mints alone account for more than 4,000 cases of type 2 diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure and stroke each year, said Worthington.

approximately eight cinnamon-flavored cookies about the size of grapes. That lasted all of a year.

"I just open the bags and dump all the cookies into one bowl," admitted one suburban mother who declined to be named. "Sometimes, when the kids are at school, I stick my entire face right in there and just start chewing."

The Girl Scouts have also come under fire from the Boy Scouts of America, who say their own popcorn sale fundraisers can't possibly compete. "Would you buy a \$25 tin of popcorn when for 4 bucks you can have an entire box of thin, minty goodness?" asked Brian Mendelson, "Popcorn Colonel" for the Yankee Clipper Council of Boy Scout Troops in Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

Another Boy Scout offering, a \$20 tin of trail mix, has had particularly sluggish sales, despite desperate attempts to market it. In one flyer, a Scout is shown in the woods using the tin to fend off an attacking bear.

But it's the health concerns regarding the Girl Scout cookies that raise the most flags for Dr. Worthington and other medical professionals. "I hate to use the words health crisis," said Worthington. "Oh, who am I kidding? I love to use those words. And this is a health crisis if there ever was one."

"Not to mention that it's teaching Girl Scouts that it's okay to kill people as long as you make a profit," he said.

But not all Girl Scouts agree. "We're just trying to make people happy and earn money for our troop," said Michaela Hutchinson, 8, of Troop 80022 in Allegan, Michigan. "It makes me sad that people say these mean things. But let's face it, anyone who eats that many cookies probably deserves to get diabetes."

sure to visit the upper and lower falls if you make this truly epic (and soggy) trip.

Bond Falls. Spectacular drop that is quite a ways from Houghton in Ontonagon County, but is worthwhile if you're heading south along US-45. The falls are located in Bond Falls State Park and are easily accessed via maintained pathways. While you're in the area, be sure to visit Agate Falls, an equally impressive waterfall right off the road.

Silver Creek Falls. A cute little waterfall off of 5 Mile Point Road in Keweenaw County. The trail into the falls isn't well marked or visible, so you're better off bushwhacking your way in. The falls aren't too far along the river but are somewhat secluded and not visited heavily whatsoever. The river is marked on the road; park near the bridge and hike upriver from there.

What about the popular falls like Hungarian, O-Kun-De-Kun, and Douglass Houghton? Everybody knows about those already! There are plenty of other waterfalls out there worth visiting; you just have to know where to look. I've created a map of these falls and a ton of other places worth visiting, so get out and explore!
