Invincible's Guide to the Keweenaw, Pt. 9

Winter has arrived! Huzzah! That means the dreary grey weather will soon be replaced by an eternal blanket of the white stuff, hopefully until April. With so much of the Keweenaw's recreational opportunities revolving around snow, look forward to a lot of adventures taking you to some of the most awe-inspiring, wind-swept locations around. We'll take it slow at first since there isn't too much snow on the ground... yet!

Steve Farm at Lovell Creek. Welcome to the newest public nature area in the Keweenaw! The Keweenaw Land Trust (KLT) just closed on this property a few short weeks ago, having been generously gifted 96 acres from a local family to keep the place open to the public and wildlife for future generations. The name is a bit deceiving, as there is no farm there. The nature area is primarily wetlands, with beaver dams dotting the landscape and seasonal wet areas always keeping you on your toes. Lovell Creek's headwaters can be found nearby, but don't take my word for it - get out there on the ground and search for it!

The Steve Farm at Lovell Creek can be found just a couple miles outside of Dollar Bay on a lobe of land called Point Mills. You'll want to take Upper Point Mills south out of Dollar Bay and up the steep hill, passing a few old farms and homes along the way. Eventually the road makes a sharp right. Keep following this, making another right-hand turn onto what signs call Lower Point Mills Road (it's still the upper one though). Really all you want to do is avoid going down Senter Road, which heads to the left.

Once you make that second right turn, be on the lookout for a small woods road entering the property on the right just before the forest ends and wetlands begin (about 0.2 miles). That's your best access point for the time being, so park near it and hike in. The KLT will develop a small parking area and signage there next summer, and we will be leading a snowshoe hike on January 25th. I'll share more closer to that time, but for now feel free to hike

Conglomerate Falls. While it's not one of the most impressive waterfalls in the Keweenaw for sheer drop, Conglomerate Falls is still a very scenic area to visit. Now may be one of the best times to get out there, before the river freezes up and deep snow makes it difficult to access. Additionally, the light snow will make your photos that much more beautiful! The falls (more rapids than anything) are mostly at the bottom of a steep gorge, so viewing them can be tough if you're not careful.

Conglomerate Falls is owned by the North Woods Conservancy, a small land trust buying up key parcels around Keweenaw County. They often charge you to visit their nature areas (Seven Mile Point comes to mind), but fortunately visiting these falls is free.

To get to the falls, take US-41 north to Ahmeek. Hang a left onto Five Mile Point Road, and follow this until you see South Farmers Block Road on the left. Turn here, and head straight down the road until you run out of straightaway and the road veers sharply to the right. To avoid getting your vehicle stuck deep in the woods on a slippery and narrow 2-track, park here and hike in. Follow the woods road and trails using dead reckoning, listening for the telltale signs of a waterfall in the distance to guide your way. The hike one-way is maybe 0.5 miles or so and is manageable for most hikers. 🌲
