The Ghost of Aerial Photography's Past: Kite Flying!

I'd set a timer, toss it in the air as high as I dared (30-50 feet), and attempted to catch it. The catching part was trickier than I thought, which wound up with a couple broken cameras and a lot of blurry photos to show for it. Perfection was tough.

One day last winter, I had an epiphany: what if I attached a camera on a kite? I bet I could get awesome photos that way! I still don't know where I came up with the idea, but as is turns out there are a decent number of people who do just that. I was in luck! It's known as kite aerial photography (or KAP for short), and there are probably a couple thousand dedicated folks that do this around the world, with many more dabbling here and there. I ain't no dabbler, so I took to it like a kite to a heavy breeze.

Probably the easiest part (at first) was choosing my camera. I already had upgraded my throwing camera to a waterproof, ruggedized Panasonic, which had proved itself worthy of the worst falls onto rocks. Selecting a kite came next: I went with a 9ft Levitation Delta, a giant colorful wing that bucks and weaves in gusty weather like a bullfighter. It's kinda sketchy but does the job in medium winds. With those two pieces covered, I built a massive kite reel for 1000' of line and a rig to house the camera. Servos hooked up to a little chip press the shutter and I'm set!

For about \$150 of initial investment (not counting camera), I had a fully automated aerial photography rig that is both fun to fly and significantly safer and easier to work than a drone or R/C plane or copter. Of course, see Let's Go Fly a Kite on back

Engineers WIth Borders



that initial investment only got me so far. I'd need lower wind kites (6.5' and 8' rokkaku), replacement parts for when things crash, and constant upgrades to get better photos. It's paying off though, which is more than could be said about my camera throwing hobby.

Why use a kite instead of a drone? Well, for one it's way cheaper. Either of my rokakku kites in a steady breeze of 6-12 mph can more than lift the equivalent weight of a DSLR, and they both cost at most \$150 each. You'd need a really pricey drone to be able to lift that amount of weight, and then you'd be limited by the battery life. My KAP rig can fly for hours at a time, gathering thousands of photos with a limited amount of effort. Plus, who doesn't love kites?! Drones are loud, intrusive, and prone to randomly crashing into things. Kites have only to worry about trees, Iulls in the wind, and Charlie Brown.

Still hard to believe that a kite aerial photography rig can pull it off? Check out and like my facebook page at www.facebook.com/KAP.Invincible. I'm able to fly from the ice now, so be on the lookout for me as you travel the Keweenaw. I guarantee I'm the only guy out there flying a kite in -20°F windchills. 🏠
