MTU Introduces Student Evaluations

As the spring semester draws to a close, MTU was proud to announce that, along with the regular course evaluations, there is also now new Student Evaluations.


Unlike course evaluations, which are completed by students to provide feedback on the instructors and structure of the courses they have taken, the student evaluations will be available for instructors to fill out as well as students. Whereas course evaluations focus on course structure and style of instruction, student evaluations will contain questions primarily focused on the quality of the student being evaluated, based on three main criteria: Integrity, Annoyingness, and Punchability.

“One major aspect of any student at any place of learning is their Academic Integrity”, one university representative explained. Questions concerning integrity were broken down to everyone’s favorite input format: sliders.
