An Examination of the Recent Disaster on MTU's Campus

Things that Go Bump in Flight

As you no doubt all know, campus has been under severe lockdown for the past 4 days, shaken by the recent catastrophe that occurred October 32nd. While we still don't have all the details, a large POP and accompanying pressure wave were felt across campus, knocking over trees and pedestrians and shattering all of the windows in Grover C. Dillman hall. Three buildings—Administration, the ROTC building, and the EERC, were completely destroyed. Witnesses recall how the buildings imploded into nothing, leaving only a small cloud of pink glitter as sign of their existence. Outside of those buildings, crowds of pedestrians entered a state of hysteria, most running towards Walker lawn or the SDC as howling winds stoked multicolored fires and all of the light-poles and trees on campus were violently uprooted and launched at high speed into the air or canal. Several students were seen to have been pulled underneath the lawn by an unknown force. Concerned calls reporting the disturbing noise came in from all over the area, as far as Atlantic Mine. Reports say that even one student in the Forestry Building raised their head and asked if something had happened. The pressure wave and rapid displacement of tens of pounds of soil and foundation sent reverberations in all directions, including north into the Portage canal. Increased chop and a small surge of water were recorded, washing away the Houghton riverwalk and capsizing two sailboats.

In the immediate aftermath, authorities converted the Rozsa center and MacInnes arena into aid stations, dispensing meals, treating wounds and helping those affected gather and



seek solace. Since Chartwells was ill equipped to feed all the hungry students, reserves of MREs and stale granola bars were brought forth from Cold War storage. Hungry students stated that they were "about a horse a piece" with what Chartwells could offer. While students and staff did their best to recover from The Incident, responders on scene had finished rescuing people, moving instead to determine the cause.
